That's right, folks; technically, that aunt who only gave you money for Christmas was being the most faithful to the original legend.


Unfortunately, Saint Nicholas lived in Turkey, which is generally considered a fairly warm place. So where did the North Pole come



On December 6, 1989,

these fourteen women -- one nursing student, one administrator, and twelve engineering students -- were murdered in the École Polytechnique massacre, the deadliest mass shooting in Canadian history. It is a story that hits terrifyingly close; these women were specifically targeted because they were studying engineering... because they were perceived feminists.

Every year on December 6th, the Government of Canada recognizes the National Day of Remembrance and Action on


Violence Against Women. It is a way to remember and honour victims of gender-based violence while taking meaningful action to eliminate misogyny, sexism, and hate.

I feel fortunate to live in a time and place where I can pursue a career that I love. However, violence and discrimination remain daily realities for women and girls everywhere and can take many forms. When it comes to creating meaningful change, we all share the responsibility.

Wear a white ribbon on December 6th to show your support.





CSCE TAKES FREDERICTON HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE 2018 CSCE CONFERENCE

This past June, we had the opportunity to represent CSCE Carleton Chapter at the annual Canadian Society for Civil Engineering Conference held in Fredericton, New Brunswick. The theme for this year's conference was Building Tomorrow's Society. The week was spent attending presentations and workshops expanding our technical knowledge, socializing with fellow engineering students and professionals, and enjoying the beautiful capital of New Brunswick.

The conference began with a reception held at the Crown Plaza Hotel, where students and pro-

fessionals were encouraged to mingle. Following the reception was the first night of the young professionals' events, where we were able to meet fellow engineering students and recent graduates from universities across Canada. The next morning was the beginning of the technical program, with more than 100 researchers giving presentations. Sessions ranged from Concrete Reinforcement Technology to Future Effects on Water Resources to Engineering Management, to Data Simulation and Modeling: From application to influencing travel. With the presentations varying in topics, we were each able to attend a session that we had interest in. Each session had approximately five speakers/papers being presented in them.

There are a couple of sessions that I found quite interesting. The first one was the Planning the Keswick Substation Transformer Move portion of the Engineering Management session. I specifically found this case interesting because it looked at all the different requirements that it would take to move a 255-ton transformer. The pro-

ject was multi-phased. The first phase looked at potential transportation methods (train, boat, or truck) and – once they decided on using a truck – the potential route. Things they had to account for in choosing the route were whether local bridges would be able to support the weight of the transformer and the effect of the slow-moving truck on local traffic. The second phase of the project was to enact a Traffic Management Plan which would cover traffic control, protect infrastructure, and develop an emergency vehicle plan. I found this presentation quite interesting because it opened my eyes to all the things that must be considered when moving something so significant.


The second session I found quite interesting was Protective Design. The main thing that I got from it came from the presentation about Computer Software for the Design of Blast Resistant Window Retention Anchors. I learned that you can design a window to withstand a blast, but anchoring it to the wall is not understood well. This stuck with me because it reminds me that

sometimes you need to focus on the smaller details. The objective of keeping the window intact will succeed but the objective in keeping the window in place will fail because smaller details were not considered, like the bolts.

Another wonderful opportunity that we got to experience was the Student Leadership Workshop. This workshop was held for all the executives from different Universities across Canada, to meet and discuss. We talked about some strengths and weaknesses of our societies, some challenges that we face as a group, and ways that we have overcome these obstacles. We were able to get fun new event ideas from other universities that we are eager to bring to Carleton.

Overall, the annual CSCE Conference provided us with lots to think about. It was a great opportunity to meet fellow engineering students and professionals that are passionate about building a better society tomorrow. Who knows what the future holds and what the 2019 conference in Montreal will be like.
